DIRECTOR'S NOTE

Throughout my final year with the Niagara University Theatre, my studies have focused on the meaning of identity and how personal identity translates into everything we do. Personal markers such as race, gender, ethnicity, sexuality, and much more play such a large role in our lives, both in the day-to-day functions as well as the art that we produce.

INFORMATIONAL GUIDE

Coming into the world of *Independence*, by Lee Blessing, we are brought into a family dynamic that differs from your typical idea of an American family. *Independence* brings a sense of truth and explores the varying degrees of human relationships, especially within a familial environment. We are given a personal look into the world of Evelyn Briggs and the dysfunctional relationship she has with her three daughters. It seems as though Evelyn's mental state is a barrier that draws a divide between her and her daughters. This play helps us to recognize the stigma of mental health in today's society and the need to advocate for better mental health, especially among women. The set of data below will help bring together certain questions that the play presents- how does mental health affect family life and relationships? How does mental health differ between men and women? What is the importance of mental health advocacy? And most importantly, why is there a stigma behind mental health and illness in today's society?

Parents with a history of mental illness expose children to increased rates of depression and other mental illnesses when being compared to children of parents who do not have any affective illness. According to Mental Health America, children whose parents have a mental illness are at risk for developing social, emotional, and/or behavioral problems. The severity and duration of a parent's mental illness, the extent of their symptoms, and how their condition affects their behavior and familial relationship, will determine the risk of their child developing similar conditions. It also appears that a mother's affective state has a more profound effect on the child than a father's illness. Research has shown that there are identified differences between men and women in regard to risk, prevalence, and treatment of mental health. Though, men and women have similar rates of mental health problems, the types of conditions experienced may differ.

In the United States, 1 in 5 women have a mental health condition such as depression, post traumatic stress disorder (PTSD), or an eating disorder. Twice as many women experience depression in their lifetime than men, and approximately 1 in 9 women, 18 and older have had at least one major depressive episode within the past year. ⁴ Women are also twice as likely to experience PTSD or an anxiety disorder or panic disorder. In addition to this, women attempt suicide more often than men, however, men are four times more likely to die by suicide, according to the American Psychiatric Association. ⁵

There are often myths and misperceptions about mental health, and the people who live with mental illness, that contribute to the stigma surrounding the topic of mental health. In certain cultures and environments, mental health can be viewed as a taboo topic. Those who live with mental illness or mental health conditions may also be afraid or scared to speak up about how it affects their livelihood. However, the less we talk about it, the less we are able to speak up and normalize the occurrence of mental health issues in our society. 6 The stigma surrounding mental illness causes people to feel ashamed for something that is out of their control. This poses the question: "How do you fight the stigma?". The National Alliance on Mental Illness suggests the following as some ways to stand up to the stigma: talk openly about mental health, educate yourself and others on mental illness, be conscious of language and refrain from using mental health conditions as adjectives, encourage equality between physical and mental illness, be honest about mental health treatment, and do not harbor self-stigma. You can make a difference by acknowledging that mental illness is not anyone's fault, regardless of societal stigma. 7
